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Care For the Homeless Hosts Policy Forum on "The Trauma of Homelessness"

New York non-profit gathers a panel of experts to discuss and answer questions on "The Trauma of Homelessness"

New York, N.Y. – Care For the Homeless (CFH) has gathered a panel of experts to discuss and answer questions regarding the "trauma of homelessness." The seminar will take place on October 1st, 2019 and be held on the Sixth Floor Conference Room Center at 26 Federal Plaza, New York, NY.

A light breakfast will be served at 9 a.m. followed by welcoming remarks at 9:30. Afterwards, the panel discussion will go from 10-11 a.m. and conclude with an hour-long Q&A session.

The panel of experts will address how trauma is related to the causes and perpetuations of homelessness. Specific, topics will include *street homelessness*, *substance use disorder*, *adverse childhood experiences (ACES)*, and *family homelessness*.

"Trauma is a frequent precipitant of an episode of homelessness," states George Nashak, Executive Director, CFH. "And it is challenging to end an episode of homelessness without addressing the trauma that was experienced by the individual or family."

"This policy forum brings together experts and people with lived experience of homelessness to shed light on the interaction between homelessness and trauma, and to suggest approaches that can be taken by practitioners and designers of programs."

"The Trauma of Homelessness" is the first in a series of in-depth discussions being organized and presented by CFH. Future seminars will address issues related to poverty, health care, employment, housing, and more.
